Vaman Vruksha Kala literally translates as 'Dwarf Tree Art.' This ancient Indian creative art is inspired by the very celestial being of 'Vamana', the 5th Avatar or incarnation of Hindu God Vishnu of the Hindu Trimurti of Brahma, Vishnu and Shiva.

The Vamana Avatar of Vishnu adopts the worldly form of a Dwarf Brahmin Priest. Though diminutive in size this Avatar has a formidable purpose of protecting all creation and destroying all evil in Heaven, Earth and Hell. The effect of Vamana is calming, soothing, assuring as well as inspiring and empowering, all at the same time.

That Vaman Vrukhsa Kala, originated in India and travelled to the world, is yet another glorious feather in Indian crown of ancient innovations. Even today it inspires us to create our miniature Landscapes and Bonsai.

What is Bonsai?

An Eternal Connection with Existence!

Bonsai are miniature facsimiles of trees as they are found in nature. Created by combining botanical knowledge, horticultural technique and artistic creativity with balance, simplicity and harmony of nature.

The word bonsai, roughly translated means potted (bon) plant (sai). Connoisseurs of the art strive to maintain a balance between plant, pot and nature. Working in harmony with nature and not controlling it is the underlying philosophy of the art of bonsai.

The art of Bonsai has its roots in India. Ancient ayurvedic physicians often grew medicinal plants in miniature to conveniently move them around. In the 12th century India, Bonsai was known as Vamanatanu Vrikshadi Vidya, which translates as the science of dwarfing trees. The practice travelled to China and onto Japan, where the art was greatly refined.

In the mid-19th century, when Japan opened its doors to the world, Bonsai reached Europe with the Great Exhibitions in France and London. Modern bonsai art returned to India in the mid-20th century. Bonsai in India is continually evolving as an art form, with a very distinctive style and approach of its own, with bonsai enthusiasts from across India, infusing their very own essences.

Every bonsai tells a unique story, a story that is woven deep into its very core and fabric of this unique creation. With mystical and aesthetic symbolism, every detail contributes to the mystery encompassed within the bonsai. Container, accessories and their colours are carefully chosen to represent elements and hues found in nature. Every twist and turn of a branch symbolising age and the journey through time.

Every bonsai creator has a very close inter-connection with their bonsai. Working with Bonsai gives great peace and release from stress, anxiety and worry. Bonsai teaches the value of space, time, age, nature and of virtues such as simplicity, patience and last but not the least, life!

Bonsai are complex; yet simple creation and have a way of not just moving the creator but also having a profound, mystical and magical effect on the beholder.

Over her 32 years of dedication and experience in bonsai, and has travelled around the country and the world in pursuit of her of passion. Prajakta, has acquired a wealth of knowledge and experience in the care, growth and propagation of bonsai. Over the years she has created a colossal collection of over 2000 bonsai many of them world class, in practically every style and school of bonsai that you can think of: Traditional Japanese, to Artistic Bujin, to delicate Sohin to Landscape sized Raft Styles some of the largest sized Mountain Plantings, anyway in the world.

Her style of growing bonsai has been influenced by her travels and by Bonsai Masters from around the world, but her primary influencers has been Bonsai Master Rudy Najaon of Indonesia, a publish author and international teacher who has travelled the world teaching the art of bonsai.






Formal Upright Bonsai

A bonsai tree trained in the formal upright style mimics the growth of a tree under perfect natural conditions. It should be balanced, but not perfectly symmetrical. The trunk should have an obvious taper, with the widest point at the bottom. Formal upright style is considered the most difficult for the novice bonsai grower, as getting a suitable taper and a well balanced bonsai tree requires time, patience and perseverance.










Formal Upright




Informal Upright Bonsai


Less strict than the formal upright, this form is the most commonly seen in nature. The trunk can twist, turn, and change direction as it would in nature based on the environment. They can grow away from the wind or upwards towards the sunlight.











Slanting Style Bonsai


The trunk slants in one direction, and the roots often are larger on the opposite side, providing a counter balance. This style evokes the image of a tree reaching out into the sunlight from the shade of a large tree, or it could evoke the image of a tree that has suffered some natural disaster, perhaps been partially blow-over and looking like it is on the brink of falling over.












Semi Cascade


Often in nature you see trees growing over the river where the main branch spans out over the river reaching out to the light over the river. Bonsai that have their branches hanging below the rim of the pot but not below the base of the pot are representative of these trees.











Cascade

This design mimics the growth of a tree on the side of a mountain. In this style, the tree growing tip extends below the base of its container. The natural tendency for trees is to grow upwards so it can be very difficult to attain vigor in a bonsai that is trained forced to grow downwards. Cascades style is not recommended for beginners.











